Why is this program important?

European Master in Stroke Medicine is the only dedicated post-graduate program in Europe for physicians who are involved with the care of stroke patients. The ESO scholarship offers a significant financial aid to the students in order to complete their training in stroke medicine.

What you have learned/ are you learning?

I have improved my knowledge and skills and through this program, I acquired the "know-how" to set up a stroke service offering thrombolysis in my hospital.

Are your personal expectations met?

Why is this program important?

I have been a stroke physician for last 5 years and I already did my master in stroke medicine from Keele University, UK. However, I want to be pioneer of stroke medicine and after a long research, I found out that European Masters is the best available masters in Europe. It's very much into innovation in stroke medicine and gives you a platform for growing and learning further.

What you have learned/ are you learning?

Basic medical graduates learn only a little about stroke in their training and when you do a postgraduate faculty assume that students have learned all basics of stroke in their graduation. So there is only minimum effort made to teach about pathophysiology or molecular changes in stroke. So this course enable me to learn from basics of stroke and formal teaching especially into imaging category.

Are your personal expectations met?

Very much. I would take this opportunity to say that this course is very much evidence based.

What is the most positive aspect of the program?

All our professors are pioneers in their own fields and with sound knowledge and with great enthusiasm to teach their students. I think the faculty is the greatest attraction in this course.

How do you plan to make use of the networking opportunities?

I do work in a stroke unit which is fairly new. So I am trying to make this unit 24/7, so I am trying to draw the necessary guidance from network to implement this.

I am extremely happy to successfully complete this second masters in stroke medicine and to teach my colleagues or medical students in our clinical setup. This course gave me the sound knowledge and equipped me to do so.

Why is this program important?
